


3rd graders tested the reactions of different substances with vinegar and Diet Coke! Which material do you think inflated the balloons the most?

The following are areas being covered in music

Pre K: circle dances, continued rhythms with rests, long and short sounds

Kindergarten: high and low sounds, identifying percussion instruments, Carnival of the Animals

First grade: rhythms with rests, Carnival of the Animals, brass family


Second grade: brass and woodwind family, notes with the amazing dot, what's in a measure

Third grade: ballads, more about the staff, reading music and resonator bells

Fourth grade: time signatures with the 8 on the bottom, what's a key signature, how to build a scale


Fifth grade: various eras of music (similarities and differences), creating a rondo (form of music) using poems and songs

Sixth-Eighth grade: theme and variations, studying various songs/songs from movies with a character's theme, create a simple variation from a familiar tune (pitched and non-pitched instruments, vocals)

In religion, the fourth graders are learning about the fourth Commandment, honoring your parents. In fourth grade English, the students are reviewing proper punctuation.

In fifth grade English, the students have just completed their compare/contrast essays and are now moving onto using and identifying adverbs correctly.

Sixth through eighth grade English students are working hard on a research essay of their choice. This will be complete with a bibliography and at least five sources.

Miss Amanda Imo: Religion, Math, Reading, Vocabulary/Spelling (4-5)

Fifth Grade: The fifth graders have completed their study of the Sacraments. They worked on creating a Sacrament Book throughout the year that contains all the information they learned about each Sacrament. The book is now complete and they can look back at all they learned. During math, the students learned how to multiply and divide fractions and mixed numbers. In literature, the students have been reading and analyzing various folk tales.

Fourth Grade: The students have been working hard on relating decimals and fractions in math. They also learned how to compare and order decimals. During literature, the students have read the book *Shiloh*. They then watched the movie and wrote a compare/contrast essay on the similarities and differences between the book and the movie. They did a great job figuring out how to organize their thoughts.

**Mrs. Christy Connor: Religion (6) Social Studies (4-8)**

Religion: We are completing our study of the Judges with the last and greatest Judge, Samuel. We will then begin learning about the Kings.

SS 4: We are working on the various regions of the United States and are continuing to work on note-taking skills.

SS 5: The students in grade 5 are studying about the American Revolution. We also are working on note-taking skills.

SS 6: Sixth grade students are finishing up their study of the Maya, Aztec, and Inca people. We recently created the rules for an Aztec board game.

SS 7: Students in grade 7 have learned about some of the reforms that took place in the United States before the Civil War. This includes reforms in women's rights, political change, and improvements in education.

SS 8: We have completed learning about the Civil Rights Movement in the United States. The students have also studied how Civil Rights were brought about in St. Louis.

Miss Ashley Schaaf Standard Math & Challenge Math (6-7-8) Pre Algebra, Algebra (7-8)

In standard math, I am introducing integers. This means students will be exploring negative numbers.

In challenge math, we are exploring area of various figures.

In pre-algebra, we are delving into systems of equations. We will practice solving them by graphing, elimination, and substitution.

In algebra, we finished with radical expressions, and are exploring rational expressions.

Mrs. Jennifer Runiewicz: Literature (6-8) Religion (7-8)

Return from spring break, we will begin our Shakespeare unit. Eighth grade will read *Romeo and Juliet*, 7th will read *Merchant of Venice*, and 6th will read *The Taming of the Shrew*. Please encourage students to review every night and discuss the events that they read. Shakespeare is a difficult genre to get through, but with constant review, the students will be successful.

During this last month, 8th grade religion has learned about various Protestant churches and religious orders of priests, monks, and brothers. This next month we will learn about our responsibilities as we mature in the church.

In addition to our Confirmation preparation, 7th grade religion has been continuing to learn about Christ's Passion, death, and resurrection. We will complete our Confirmation preparation and learn how we are called to serve others through the various gifts of the Holy Spirit received at Confirmation.

Vocabulary Workshop schedule should be taped/stapled to your student's vocabulary book cover or in their assignment notebooks. I have also shared the schedule with each of them on Google Drive. Unit 11 test is April 4th and Unit 12 test will be April 18th.
